Class Room Sessions





Our classroom sessions covered everything about mangroves from the basics of Identification to its possible resilience to climate change and its overall importance as a species. We also covered the basics of planting to the transplanting of larger plants.

Field Trips & Working Sessions

Each year we have had at least 4 field trips or outdoor working session. Every time we learn something new we go out in the field.



Workshops & Focus Groups

We set up several workshops to train locals adults
for leadership of different aspects of restoration.




 Focus groups are sometimes necessary in order to get things more organized the way you want them without the clashing of too many heads. We achieve much more with smaller groups than with lager community groups.
